Rabbi Jennie Rosenn is vice president for community engagement at HIAS, where she mobilizes the Jewish community to advance the rights of refugees in the U.S. and globally. Previously, she served as Director of the Jewish Life and Values Program at the Nathan Cummings Foundation and as a rabbi at Columbia/Barnard Hillel. A founding board member of AVODAH and Repair the World, she has twice been named to the Forward's 50 Jews in America. Rabbi Rosenn was ordained by Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion where she was a Wexner Graduate Fellow.
